## From Pastor Mike

On the first Sunday in June, as the passages from Isaiah were being read, I looked over at the altar, all beautifully prepared for the Eucharistic feast that we were about to partake, and I took note that this was the last Communion that I would preside over at Main Street. I was filled with both a sense of loss, and a wave of gratitude. I mentioned in the homily how I treasure this verse of Scripture: "How lovely, how beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news."

In my message, I spoke about how we do not often think of our feet that way, but to truly be grabbed by this image it is helpful to go back in time, back in time before cell phones, text messaging, and Facebook Messenger. Way back in time even before landline phones that hung on kitchen walls taking up a good deal of space—back in time before telegrams, and even before Pony Express. Back in time, when the only way to get a message from Jerusalem to some far away outpost of the country was to send a messenger who ran the whole way. And one can imagine after running that far, the feet are calloused and injured. It is these feet, these dirty, tired, bloody feet of the messenger that are called beautiful.

The Scriptures tell us that all of those preaching good news, peace, and God's kingdom have beautiful, lovely feet. When Isaiah 52:7 is read in church—"How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good

tidings of good things, who proclaims salvation, who says to Zion, "Your God reigns!"—when that Scripture is read, I want to turn to Victoria, Phil, Wayne, Nancy, Al, Tina, Betsy, Kathryn, Clay, Jenny, Anthony, Theo, Cynthia, Kellie, and Willie, and say, "Mercy, you all got some beautiful feet!" And when we sing, "Take my life, and let it be consecrated, Lord, to thee. Take my moments and my days; let them flow in ceaseless praise. Take my hands and let them move at the impulse of thy love. Take my feet and let them be swift



and beautiful for thee." And when we sing those words, I want to say to all of you, "My goodness, you all got some beautiful feet."

What an absolute honor and privilege it is to be the Senior Pastor of Main Street United Methodist Church, a church that dares to care, a church committed to both knowing and sharing the life-changing love of Jesus Christ. In the last six years, we have built a beautiful Connections Building to strengthen and foster our fellowship and ministries. In the last six years, we navigated a once in a hundred-year global pandemic that paralyzed the nation and the world, but the work of the church continued as we navigated livestream, and later practiced social distancing and mask-wearing. In the last six years, there have been many political and social storms. In the last six years, there were also many ecclesiastical storms within the United Methodist Church, and there were numerous congregations that divided into opposing camps with open hostility among members.

Main Street, I am so proud of how you have navigated all the curve balls thrown, all the challenges, and how we have kept our eyes on Christ our Lord. As I preach my last sermon on June 30 and then move to retirement after thirty-six years of working in the fields of our Lord, I will do so with a tremendous sense of gratitude—grateful for all that we have shared—grateful that I will always carry you in my heart and remember you in prayer—and grateful that we serve Christ our Lord who is with us in this world and when time itself fades into eternity.






### CLEAR GLASS BUD VASES NEEDED

Here's a brief update of Main Street's financial status as of May 31. This month we have good news and bad news. Building fund contributions have sufficiently funded our first five monthly loan payments with \$5,877 remaining to apply to the June \$12,000 payment. Regular budget giving has fallen behind during the last couple of months. Through May 31, regular giving of \$389,997 was insufficient to fund required expenses. Expenses were \$432,991 which is nearly \$43,000 above giving to date. Unfortunately, we are operating at a deficit and have had to use our operating reserve to cover

expenses. We have also postponed a portion of our missions and connectional disbursements. God has blessed Main Street year after year with the resources to continue strong ministries on and off our church campus. Together we can make great things happen if we all step up and do our part. Let's remember our vows to faithfully participate in Main Street's ministries with our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness.

#### How General Conference 2024 Affects Main Street UMC

Earlier this month, the United Methodist Church concluded its 2024 General Conference. This General Conference passed several pieces of consequential legislation. Main Street UMC's Church Council encourages all who read this document to refer to the "General Conference Legislative Recap," located in May's *Main Stream*, for a list of the major legislative changes passed at General Conference.

To express how these legislative changes affect MSUMC in its capacity as a local church, Church Council has approved this document.

Moving forward, MSUMC's Church Council encourages the congregation to honor the *Relational Covenant* passed by Church Council in 2008 and reaffirmed in 2024. By honoring the *Relational Covenant*, the congregation commits to, "loving, trusting and respecting one another by treating each other as we desire to be treated and by making allowances for one another's differences and shortcomings."

Please see the below summary of how General Conference 2024 affects Main Street UMC.

#### Disaffiliation

- MSUMC's position on disaffiliation *prior to* General Conference:
  - ♦ In its January 2023 meeting, Church Council unanimously approved the following motion: "to postpone and discontinue any discussions of disaffiliation from the United Methodist Church until after the 2024 General Conference." Church Council approved this motion for a few key reasons:
    - ◆ The cost to disaffiliate from the UMC in 2023 would have been over \$600K, an amount that hugely exceeded MSUMC's available cash.
    - ♦ General Conference had not yet occurred, and Church Council chose not to make rash choices based on decisions not yet made.
    - Because MSUMC has a diverse make-up of opinions about human sexuality and the church, Church Council felt participating in the disaffiliation process would risk a mass exodus of members.
       Dr. Mike Gehring shared with Church Council examples of multiple UMC congregations similar to MSUMC that have collapsed as a result of disaffiliation proceedings.
      - \* Given that disaffiliation would have resulted in a drastic increase of financial liability and a massive decrease in membership, MSUMC would have faced a loss of staff, services, and missions.
      - Disaffiliation would thus have left a depleted membership with the burden of \$1.3 million of debt.<sup>2</sup>
    - ◆ In the event of disaffiliation, MSUMC would have lost its entire pastoral staff and no future UM clergy appointments would be made to MSUMC.

- MSUMC's current position on exiting the denomination, now that General Conference has concluded:
  - MSUMC acknowledges that at this time it cannot exit the UMC for the following reasons:
    - ◆ General Conference removed ¶ 2553 from The Book of Discipline, ending the disaffiliation policy that was added by the special 2019 General Conference.
      - \* The process of "disaffiliation" no longer exists. Local churches who desire to exit the denomination would refer to pre-2019 procedures, described in ¶ 2549 of *The Book of Discipline*.
      - \* In January 2023, Church Council had no way of knowing ¶ 2553 would be removed. Multiple bishops, including Bishop Ken Carter, expressed the belief that ¶ 2553 would be renewed.
      - \* Even when ¶ 2553 was in place, as already mentioned, the cost for MSUMC to disaffiliate would have been upwards of \$600k. With the removal of ¶ 2553, the cost to exit the UMC surpasses multiple millions.<sup>3</sup> In short, exiting the denomination would cause financial ruin.
    - Because MSUMC has a diverse make-up of opinions regarding human sexuality and the church, the exiting process would risk a mass exodus of members. Many UMC congregations similar to MSUMC have collapsed as a result of disaffiliation/exit proceedings. Collapse of membership is a serious risk regardless of the outcome of a vote.
      - \* Given that exiting the denomination would result in a drastic increase of financial liability and a massive decrease in membership, MSUMC would face a loss of staff, services, and missions.
      - Exiting the denomination would thus leave a depleted membership with the burden of \$1.3 million of debt.<sup>4</sup>
    - ♦ If MSUMC were to exit the UMC, MSUMC would lose its entire pastoral staff and would receive no future UM clergy appointments.
    - For all of these reasons, remaining in the UMC gives MSUMC the best opportunity to fulfill our mission, which is "to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

#### MSUMC's Marriage Policy

- General Conference passed legislation which allows, but does not require, local churches to hold same-sex marriage ceremonies on their campuses.
- Currently, MSUMC's *de facto* wedding policy permits no same sex weddings on campus.
- Currently, very few weddings occur on MSUMC's campus. In 2023, there were two weddings and both were small, attended mostly by family. None have occurred on campus in 2024.
- Trustees could potentially change the campus marriage policy to allow samesex weddings, with approval of Church Council.
- If trustees were to consider making such a change, it would be under the guidance of MSUMC's new pastor, Rev. Lanny Lancaster.
- Such a decision would also account for the congregation's preferences. Trustees would likely conduct a church-wide poll or utilize a similar method to gather data on the congregation's preferred marriage policy.

#### Appointment of LGBTQI Clergy to MSUMC

• From Bishop Ken Carter's letter (5/21/24): "[C]hurches that are more traditional in conviction—*The Book of Discipline* identifies this, and our Cabinet practices this—will not receive appointed clergy or conduct services that do not align with their convictions.<sup>5</sup>

With a new senior pastor beginning his service in July, MSUMC faces transition within a denomination facing transition. Please pray for discernment and patience as we work together to do God's will amid these transitions. Let us remember who we are and Whose we are as God's Kingdom unfolds in Kernersville. Finally, please refer to the full *Relational Covenant*, which holds the tools necessary for us to live in unity as scripture calls us to do.

- Worship God in reverence and joy as we prepare to go forth and serve our community, reflecting Jesus Christ as ministers of the Gospel.
- Abide and live by scriptural truths in all we say and do every day.
- Pray for one another and our church as we seek God's direction in all aspects of our life and ministry together.
- Follow God's leading by letting go of some "good things" and remaining open to the "God-things" that lead to joyful obedience.
- Serve God's Kingdom and one another in love, asking "what can we do to expand His fellowship known as the church?"
- Support the missions and ministries of our church by our prayers, presence, gifts and service.

It convenes every four years, with delegates from the denomination's regions around the world.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> This refers to the debt used to finance MSUMC's recent building project.
<sup>3</sup> See ¶ 2549 and ¶2501 of *The Book of Discipline* for processes required for local churches to exit the UMC. All local church property is held in trust by the Annual Conference. Thus, the Annual Conference dictates all terms when a local church desires to exit the denomination. MSUMC's church building is valued at \$18 million.
